istory has bound together these loosely knit colleagues, who also included Franz Kline, Clyfford Still, Robert Motherwell, and Barnett Newman, as Abstract Expressionists. But they shared neither formal manifesto nor consistent style. Like other convenient monikers, including Impressionism and Cubism, the title was created by art critics and was never embraced by the group it purportedly described. Little wonder. No single classification could encompass styles as disparate as de Kooning's emphatic brushstokes and Rothko's non-painterly evocations.



orn in the early decades of the 1900s and maturing at mid century, abstract art is a critical barometer of the extraordinary social, political, and economic evolution-even revolution-that transformed the world in a scant 100 years. The artists Kandinsky, Malevich, Mondrian, the Surrealists and, in a more limited way, Picasso are among the Europeans who set the stage for what burst forth in America after World War II. Spearheaded by the collective genius of Jackson Pollock, Willem de Kooning, Mark Rothko, Arshile Gorky, and David Smith, the art that emerged in New York in the mid 1940s not only produced America's first truly original style, but also transferred the international art capital from Paris to New York.
